## **Vicar's Letter for December 2023**

My dear people,



Who was - Julian of Norwich - who lived in Norwich in the 14th and early 15th century.

In her first fifty years, Julian was a multi-faceted woman who lived and worked in the world. Then, during the last twenty-five years of her life, she chose to become an anchoress (someone who, for religious reasons, withdraws from secular society to be able to lead an intensely prayer-orientated, ascetic, or Eucharist-

focused life), a vowed religious living by herself in a small room, called an anchorhold, attached to the parish church of St Julian at Conisford in Norwich. It was during these years that she completed the Long Text of her Revelations, and ~became much revered as a wise counsellor to all who sought her spiritual advice at her anchorage window. Today, Julian's theology continues to be an inspiration to those who long to be embraced by the love of Jesus Christ, and spent much of her life as an In May of 1373, at the age of thirty and a half, Julian of Norwich was stricken by a severe illness and became convinced she was dying. Instead, she received extraordinary visions of Christ on the cross. She recovered fully to write her very personal account of the Sixteen Revelations of Divine Love that she received from the Lord. This is the first book known to have been written by a woman in the English language.

In both the Short and Long Texts of her book, Julian documented the intimate details of her visions and locutions for her contemporaries, her evencristens (fellow Christians), as well as for us, more than six hundred years later. She insisted that "Our Lord wants us to know" about God's unconditional love, mercy, and grace; about the godly will at the very core of our being; about the lack of "wrath or blame" in God. Julian also developed a dynamic theology of the Motherhood of God that speaks to both women and men in every age.

Although a contemporary of the English poets Geoffrey Chaucer and William Langland, Julian was, by her own account, unlettered; that is, she could not read or write Latin and as such she could not study theology at Oxford or Cambridge. because in her medieval world women were not allowed to pursue higher education. Nevertheless, Julian taught herself to write Middle English with such consummate clarity, profound imagery, and rich vocabulary that she has been called "the first woman of English Letters." She also developed a mystical theology that was second to none during the fourteenth century, and which continues to break barriers in our own twenty-first century.

The simple fact that Julian was a laywoman who dared to

write mystical theology in English (despite repeated Church edicts issued against any layperson teaching or writing theology, or "making books" in the vernacular,

under pain of excommunication or even death) sends a strong message of empowerment to women of faith all over the world who struggle for the right to speak. Thomas Merton called Julian "one of the most wonderful of all Christian voices" and "the greatest English theologian." Her timeless voice is one of prophetic hope and vision that we, in the twenty-first century, desperately need to hear. She is, indeed, a mystic for all seasons.



In our suffering and violent world, when we may be tempted to lose hope, Christ's words to Julian resonate across the ages, as reassuring and as imperative as they were in May of 1373, when she first heard them: All shall be well, and all shall be well, and thou shalt see thyself that all manner of thing shall be well.

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# Postcard from a Parishioner—Every Cloud

I have been lucky enough recently, to witness some beautiful sunsets, which of course need the supporting cast of clouds. In fact, you could say I have become an avid sky watcher since moving to Forest Lodge. That first year of balmy summer evenings, we would eat alfresco, every chance available. Magnificent sunsets would see us still lingering on the patio, long after the meal was over. We arrived on the 11th of April in 2017;



with its typically showery weather, hampering the removal men unloading our precious boxes and bits of furniture. That first evening saw a double rainbow stretch across the sky above the rooftops of our main house and my 'granny flat'. We all felt it foretold good times ahead.

A balcony off my front door soon had a seat; as well as one on the back patio of the main house ....... where more often than not, this 'Granny in residence ' could be found. Not to seem idle, there would always be a bit of craft work on the go; but, if truth be

known, my hands lay quiet for most of the time, as I watched the clouds. It is a pastime of which I never seem to tire, because, just like fingerprints, every sky will be different. Even these blustery days, if there is a sunny spell, I will don my parka, grab a coffee and sit somewhere sheltered, to watch the sky.



To the backdrop of clouds of every shape and size, I have watched the comings and goings of local bird life,

small planes circling from the local Airfield and larger ones leaving jet streams. But it will always be clouds forming and moving, either gently feathering or ominously tumbling, that will hold my attention and leave me in awesome reflection. I'm not

surprised our early theologians chose the sky for God's heavenly dwelling place. I'm reminded of a very thought provoking comment from my oldest son when only three. The sun was sending spears of light through the clouds on our walk one day. "Look Mummy," he said in awe, "God has left his door open".

In these days of sadness, that threaten to overwhelm us, I'm reminded of other words.


'Every cloud has a silver lining'. A silver lining alludes to the unseen part of a dark cloud that is backlit by the sun, making it all silvery and shiny round the edges. A metaphor of course, referring to the darkness that can overpower any glimmer of hope. But, no matter how bad a situation might seem, there is good to be found. Optimism in other words . And don't we need that, when yet another horrific



news announcement sends a wave of grief washing over us? Optimism with a big capital O. With Christmas just around the corner, I can already feel the stirrings of this. The shops are now bedecked in festive attire and are displaying a multitude of goodies we might be tempted to buy. Family and friends are organising to be together for this wonderful occasion and everywhere there is an atmosphere of anticipation. 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December is the 12th month (and last month) in our modernday Gregorian calendar (as it was in the preceding Julian calendar).


However, it was originally the 10th month of the Roman calendar (until 153 BC). Hence, "December" comes from the Latin word *decem*, meaning "ten."

Back in Roman times, the calendar only had ten months and began with March! The winter period was not even assigned months because it was not an active time for military, agriculture, or civil life.

The month of December originally consisted of 30 days. When January and February were added to the calendar (around 700 BCE), December was shortened to 29 days. Then, in the subsequent Julian calendar, two days were added to December, making it 31 days long.

A new name for December came into being after many Anglo -Saxons were converted to Christianity. In line with their newfound beliefs, they called December "Heligh Monath," which translates into "Holy Month." A second name that the Anglo-Saxons had for December was "Yule Monath," which relates to the custom of burning a Yule log during this month as a part of the pagan Yule celebrations. While many of the Yule practices have been lost over time, some of them, such as burning a Yule log, is still celebrated in various parts of the world today.
